

Optimize your knowledge base search: Keywords, semantic, and tags oh my!

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Depending on the statistics you cherrypick, anywhere from 50-100% of your readers will use search to find content in your knowledge base rather than navigating through your content hierarchy.

Since search has become a dominant navigation path, you want to make sure that you're getting the most out of KnowledgeOwl's search. After all, if readers can't find your content, they think it doesn't exist.

Spoiler: you don't need to do a whole lot to keep your search results humming along well because we've designed search to work so well out of the box.

But we also recently added a new type of search called Semantic search, which we're turning on for all knowledge bases. We want you to understand what it is, why you want to use it, and how it complements the other search types.

You'll leave this session with a deeper understanding of how our search works and the various settings and levers you can pull to tweak your search behavior to wring every last ounce of functionality out of it.
